Where this is impossible, pupils have instead had the chance to learn about religious festivals and beliefs from visitors from different faiths. In previous years, we have visited St Stephen's Church as well Central Mosque. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, visits have had to be cancelled. In the coming years, we are hopeful pupils across the school will have the opportunity to visit a Gurdwara, synagogue, Mandir (Hindu temple) and cathedral which will further engage our children and help them to have a greater understanding of the Britain they live in.

Experiential RE

Experiential RE is a tool used at Raddlebarn to allow pupils to be fully immersed in a multi-sensory and captivating environment. This is done through the use of real artefacts which teach children religious traditions through various sensory methods and setting up the classroom as a stage to set religious scenes. At Raddlebarn, the children will have the opportunity to experience each of the six major religions twice before leaving in Year 6. Experiential RE is a lesson all pupils thoroughly enjoy across the school and is a lesson through which they gain a much better understanding, appreciation and acceptance of peers, friends and the community in which they live in.
