RE at Raddlebarn follows the Birmingham Agreed Syllabus which is a syllabus developed by Birmingham City Council. It follows 24 moral and cultural dispositions which cultivate and inspire children's understanding of different faiths. These dispositions are split into four tangible, interconnected aspects which are:

- •Learning from experience
- •Learning about Religious Traditions and non-religious worldviews
- •Learning from Religious Traditions and non -religious worldviews
- •Learning to Discern

Experiential RE

Experiential RE is a tool used at Raddlebarn to allow pupils to be fully immersed in a multi-sensory and captivating environment. This is done through the use of real artefacts which teach children religious traditions through various sensory methods and setting up the classroom as a stage to set religious scenes. At Raddlebarn, the children will have the opportunity to experience each of the six major religions twice before leaving in Year 6. Experiential RE is a lesson all pupils thoroughly enjoy across the school and is a lesson through which they gain a much better understanding, appreciation and acceptance of peers, friends and the community in which they live in.

Recently, staff have had training on Experiential RE in which they explored different techniques and strategies to further engage children and to maximise the impact of these lessons.
